Accelerator is part of an on going series of paintings, which explore Epp's sun bed addiction. The figure is contained within a pulsating, red hot vessel that looks simultaneously like some kind of futuristic teleportation device as it does a stand up sun bed. His skin glows with a fluorescent red hue as if the UV strip lights behind him are penetrating straight through his body; exuding the idea of the burning and suffering necessary to look good. Subtle tonal changes on the skin a reveal mask, gloves and boxer tan lines, suggesting that wearing a medical mask and gloves has become as much a part of our everyday routine as putting on a pair of boxers. The background echos the fluorescent light installations of Dan Flavin and the figure's disproportionately small hands mimic the naive drawings of Rose Wylie. Accelerator epitomises man's surrender to technology, millennial narcissism and coping with our generation's ongoing identity crisis, which is fuelled by the shallow pressures of Instagram and an image-based economy. '20:20' beams in the lower right hand corner of the painting. Twenty minutes and twenty seconds left on the sun bed timer. 2020, a year never forgotten by the world.
